

Four Sacred Medicines

Dictionary definition of *medicine*: any substance or substances used in treating disease or illness; remedy.

Many times when we hear the word medicine we think of medication or a doctor's prescription but Indigenous medicine can be anything natural that makes you feel healthier: mentally, physically, emotionally or spiritually. This notion is becoming popular in today's culture. Laughter you hear is good medicine, crying can be medicine, encouragement, generosity, all can make you feel better and thus considered medicine.

The first of the four sacred medicines which were gifted from the was sweet grass. Sweet grass grows locally and you should always be in a mood to pick any medicine. Whenever you take anything from Mother you should make an offering of a prayer to show respect to the of the plant. Sweet grass is long strands of sweet-smelling grass and can be weaved into or braided and dried. When it is braided it is considered hair and is used in ceremony. Braids of sweet grass can be used for or lit in a smudge. When it is lit in a smudge, the smoke created is used to cover yourself to purify your and will prepare you.
The second medicine is and it grows wild in NB. When you pick cedar, you offer a prayer of thanks to the spirit of the tree. The boughs you pick are like the of the tree. Like in all things, you never take more than you You must always leave enough for regrowth. Cedar is often shared as other areas do not have it growing naturally. The Ojibway put a sprig of cedar over their children's bedroom to protect them while they sleep. Cedar boughs are used to line the floor of the sweat as it has the ability to absorb. When we enter a sweat lodge ceremony we are trying to cleanse and get rid of negative emotions that we are carrying.
The third medicine is sage. There are different types of sage, white Californian sage and another from Dakoda are popular. Sage releases bad and negativity, thus purifying our minds before dancing or praying. If you have a bad lighting sage will help release the disturbing thoughts. Sage protects us.
The fourth medicine is tobacco. It is not burned in the smudge but is used as an We offer tobacco to elders or ceremonial people when we want their guidance, prayers or ceremonies. Tobacco is often placed in a piece of red cloth and tied to be offered for guidance or knowledge, this is called a tobacco There are many types of tobacco, including natural tobacco. Tobacco is sacred and not used for smoking. Most ceremonial people have an fan used to fan the smudge and cover people to help them release the burdens they don't need to carry anymore. The most important thing is to the four sacred medicines. Also, it is important to remember to use the medicine of the heart: speaking good things and thinking thoughts.
