

On September 29<sup>th</sup>, you came to our school and presented your case for the proposed closure of our school.

At the conclusion of that presentation you asked that in our Community Response we offer facts and not a heartstrings plea for keeping our school a reality so we went to work .....

So let's begin with some basic facts

- Over the last 10 years Janeville Elementary School has maintained its level of enrolment and based on economic prospects enrolments remain stable and have the potential to increase in coming years.
- Janeville Elementary School is a relatively new school, opened in 1982, with no foreseeable need for upgrades. The building has been well maintained. The use of space is impressive and efficient. We have strong emergency support teams that already have a long standing rapport with the children.
- Teachers' salaries at Janeville Elementary do not become a savings for the District. Our teachers are senior educators and their salaries will follow them to whatever new school is lucky enough to have them. Our Education Assistants will also follow our students to other schools - so is also not a savings to the district. The school has no foreseeable major capital projects pending. Closing Janeville School only gives the province a potential savings of \$77,000. That's the cost of a custodian, a part time office administrator (\$44,000) and all other current expenses (\$53,000). Minimum heating and snow removal for insurance purposes will still be needed costing (\$20,000). Are we really looking at closing this school for the sake of \$77,000?

- Janeville Elementary School has consistently provided our students with a strong academic foundation on which they have built very successful careers - Valedictorians, Honors with Distinction, Honors graduates and graduates are numerous amongst the students from Janeville Elementary. By piloting such initiatives as the current Kindergarten/Grade 1 Math project .... Janeville Elementary can sustain quality educational programs as we consistently seek opportunities for professional learning. Janeville is a leader in creative, innovative, and collaborative teaching styles which offer huge benefits to our students as well as the entire education system. Janeville Elementary is actually a school that should be studied for its successful performance instead of being considered for closure.

"As a Janeville Elementary Alumna I can say that this incredible school has had a tremendous impact on me both personally and professionally. Attending a tight-knit community-based school provided me the support, encouragement and confidence I needed to achieve my academic and professional goals through to middle school, high school, university and beyond" - L. - Travel in Northern New Brunswick, along the shore, is dangerously treacherous and unpredictable. Our winters can be brutal but do not discount the force of rain and wind through summer, spring and fall months. Trees topple, power lines go down, logs and debris are thrown up on the roads, rivers surge. Experiences that have been all too common in recent years.

- Decreased snow plow services due to budget constraints have negatively impacted the driving conditions in our area. Approx. 4 to 6 times during the past winter, Route 11, from End of Cape Road downward was closed due to inability to keep the roads open with drifting snow and high winds.
- Our buses are on the road at 6:45am to ensure they are on time for first picks up of 7:15 when roads have not yet been cleared for safe travel.
- One mistake in weather prediction could prove disastrous! It sounds clichéd to say it but ... "If you have not witnessed the realities of 'downshore' weather extremes they are impossible to comprehend". Not only their intensity but their unpredictability can be disastrous. The safety of our children rests on accurate and preventative forecasting and we all know how that can go wrong. Most families in this community have a close link with every child that attends school in this building or travels the busses that serve it. The added 50kms journey to Bathurst per day adds unnecessary burden and worry to everyone in the community.
- Parental involvement with our youth -  
Quite simply, parental involvement would likely become challenging ... the long distance to travel to the city school by parents, grandparents and other family members would make attendance difficult. And who hasn't sat in the audience at one of our Christmas Plays and had their child searching the crowd for their Mom, Dad, Grammy, Grampy, brothers and sisters? And when the connection is made the smile that crosses their faces is priceless

- a child's sense of self-worth and value growing in leaps and bounds in these important moments.

- Health, Wellness and Physical Activity have been huge issues for our schools in recent years. School menus were altered to include healthier choices for students, physical activity became our tool in fighting childhood obesity, less computer and television time at home, encouraging reading, family time and outdoor play. One of the recommendations offered by ParticipACTION report card of Canada to schools and municipalities is to "examine existing policies and by laws and reconsider those that pose a barrier to active outdoor play." To bus our children into the city you are asking them to spend 10 + hours a week in sedentary activity, in perfect weather conditions.

"The 10 or more hours a week that students would normally spend engaging in experiential learning and family time, would be spent commuting to and from school on a bus with students of ALL ages. A commute of this length is not only an inconvenience and a waste of time, but will slowly strip away the layers of heritage and tradition that this community has worked so hard to build". - K Knowles

- Loss of Connection with "HOME"  
Farming, Fishing, Hunting, Planting, Harvesting, Wood Cutting - before and after school our children take part in trap setting, moose and deer hunting, gardening, haymaking, milking cows, driving tractors, baking, knitting, quilting, sewing, horse riding, harvesting fall crops, potato picking, pickling, camping, 4 wheeling, trapping and snow removal. These are activities almost any

downshore child has knowledge of and exposure to from very young ages. When they arrive home from a day of writing, reading and arithmetic it is to spend the remaining hours of the day taking part in their family 'home' life learning life skills that contribute to the well-being of their families. The stories they write in school reflect this learning and the time spent with grandparents or aunts and uncles is invaluable.

"To a large extent, I attribute my integrity, honesty, and loyalty to the community-based education that I received at Janeville Elementary School - a kind of education that is grounded in tradition - a kind of education that is that is impossible to achieve when children are forced to attend school outside of where they live - and a kind of education that cannot be manufactured in a city-based overcrowded classroom of six year old children. I cherished the time I spent going to school in my community, and arrived at middle school with a strong sense of who I was, where I came from, and what I stood for. My experience at Janeville Elementary School taught me that it truly does take a community to raise a child."- K. Knowles

- Emergency contacts are primarily in the 'downshore' area  
With students moved to the Bathurst area and emergency contacts living 20 - 45 minutes away, the practicalities of being able to easily and quickly attend to the child's needs is compromised.

- Multiage classes encourages acceptance and involvement of ALL children, and opens doors for leadership opportunities and allows students the curriculums that best meet their individual needs.
- Family Recreational Activities  
The school gymnasium is the only venue available that is large enough to accommodate the whole community. In the event of a disaster the school is our community's safe haven. There are neither sidewalks nor safe walking places anywhere downshore. The school provides a place to walk when the weather turns cold, when the strong cold winds make outdoor activities unpleasant and unsafe and at times impossible. Volleyball, Badminton, Dodgeball, Craft Fairs, Winter Carnival Events, Concerts, Plays, Yoga and Wellness clinics - all contribute to a healthy community.

"While I chose to move away from northern New Brunswick to pursue my academic and professional goals, I do dream of one day moving back to my home town. As a family physician, I understand the importance of community-based initiatives and would love to one day give back to the community that offered me so much as a child and adolescent. That being said, if Janeville Elementary School closes and my children are denied the opportunity to attend a school in their own community, moving back to my hometown will not be an option. I know many young professionals who are products of Janeville Elementary's excellence who share this sentiment." - L. Daley

To expend energy on closing these schools diverts energy and focus from strengthening them ... and worse, wrenches community centered schools from their communities and children from the schools that will have the most likelihood of meeting their needs."

When The DEC presented in September they challenged us to prove to them the viability of keeping an underpopulated school open. We accepted the challenge and feel we have done so in spades. We have done so with common sense and an extraordinary amount of input from the people that will be permanently affected should the closure go forward. We did not go the political "Why us and not them route". We have done so determinedly and respectfully and feel we have proven beyond a shadow of a doubt the need for Janeville Elementary School in this community. And so ... If WE are truly invested in the "best interests of each child" we would like to offer you this...

\*\*\*WHEN you choose to keep our school open, we offer you our commitment to work collaboratively with Anglophone North School District to explore various opportunities in regards to recruitment, better use of our school, new initiatives and ongoing community wellness programs.\*\*\*

To close this school would be to unravel the

I find it very difficult to understand how a group of people that were not involved in the planting of these schools or in most cases not have any direct contact with the people of these rural areas, for generations these people have volunteered and given up their time and resources at no charge to the government. A lot of these schools were started with donations of free land, material and labour to build these schools. I understand that Yes! Some of the original schools have been replaced with new buildings on the same sights or in the same proximity, but always with the well being and safety of the children as their #1 priority.


Under the new guidelines for closing schools it would appear that common sense is not a consideration. It appears that the only thing that matters is numbers. When these schools were built it was education that was on the minds of the people to ensure all children were educated and transported to and from school safely. Considering the Janeville school situation of which I am very familiar because I lived in the down-shore area and attended school for 12 years there and in Bathurst. I know from personal experience having travelled from New Bandon to Bathurst what it is like to leave High School in Bathurst and know that when you rounded the Salmon Beach turn you were made aware that the weather conditions in Bathurst had nothing to do with what we were about to experience before we were safely home for the day. I can clearly remember one storm that the bus was caught in a snow drift until 12:30am before we were returned to our homes.

With this thought in mind I cannot imagine what and how you would expect a bus driver to look after children ages 5 to 18 years, we were mature high school students and were able to adapt a lot to very serious and difficult situations. I can only imagine the same situation with kindergarten and elementary and junior high students.

If you make the decision to close the Janville school as well as any other rural school without the permission and wishes of the residents of those areas, you are removing the very back bone and the rights of every individual in those communities. I do not think ,in fact "I know" that nobody has voted in anybody into office that think they have the right to remove their school without their permission just because it doesn't match what someone perceives as the proper number to sustain our rural schools. There is a number of obvious reasons why the education system has become very expensive, however it is not the rural schools causing this problem. We have and deserve to have our rural schools. Our 30 to 100 students are just as important to us as your 100+ students in the larger schools.

Before any Deck Member or Minister of Education decides to remove this right from us. Please consider a few of the previous comments that I have presented to you by this letter and the other presentations that are being made to you at this time. I will be awaiting your response November 16<sup>th</sup> when you present it to the public at a meeting that I hope will be at Janville school and not in Campbellton as previously announced. Please show enough respect and present the decision at the Janville School.

To Whom It May Concern:

I write this letter as a former Janeville Elementary School Student, a “downshore” community member, a Master’s level graduate, a teacher, and a professional who was forced to leave New Brunswick in search of work. I am approaching this letter not with anger, or resentment, but as a young person with a grave concern for my neighbors and friends. My intention is not only to present the evidence which supports why Janeville Elementary School must remain open, but also to paint a picture of the vital role this school has played in my success as a young leader, educator, and scholar.

I began at Janeville Elementary School in September of 1994 as one of ten kindergarten students. I entered this school as a little girl who just wanted to play on the monkey bars, and left this school as a young lady with a strong sense of pride and connection to my community. Whether I was walking down the road with my classmates to play at the beach, taking a short bus ride to the wharf to learn about the industry of fishing, or skipping over to the local nursing home to sing Christmas carols to my classmates’ grandparents and family friends, at a young age I was never far removed from my neighbors, my family, and my heritage.

To a large extent, I attribute my integrity, honesty, and loyalty to the community-based education that I received at Janeville Elementary School – a kind of education that is grounded in tradition – a kind of education that is impossible to achieve when children are forced to attend school outside of where they live – and a kind of education that cannot be manufactured in a city-based overcrowded classroom of six-year-old children. I cherished the time I spent going to school in my community, and arrived at middle school with a strong sense of who I was, where I came from, and what I stood for. My experience at Janeville Elementary School taught me that it truly does take a community to raise a child.

I am concerned that if Janeville Elementary School is closed, we will not only lose the heart of our community, but will also rob its current and future students of the valuable place-based education that has been so intrinsic to the success and identities of its past students. Jimerson (2006) points out that small schools are “frequently the glue that binds together small communities, serving as their economic and social hub. Small villages that lose their schools lose more than a building—they lose their collective cultural and civic center” (Jimerson, 2006, p. 5). To close this school would be to unravel the social fabric of this community.

In addition, closure of this school would also mean robbing students of the opportunity to work with their parents on farms, fishing boats, and in lumberyards before and after school. The fifteen or more hours a week that students would normally spend engaging in experiential learning and family time, would be spent commuting to and from school on a bus filled with students of all ages. A commute of this length is not only an inconvenience and a waste of time, but it will slowly strip away the layers of heritage and tradition that this community has worked so hard to build.

New Brunswick people have a strong sense of pride in our rural identity. We encourage newcomers to explore our most scenic driving routes, and invite tourists into our small towns to experience the close-knit culture that defines who we are. And so I wonder, what might our province begin to look like if we disconnect our students from their communities at such an early age? In what ways are we investing in our future as a province if we continue to take away the very things that its people care about so much? What will influence young people like myself to

return to their childhood communities to raise a family, if there are limited educational opportunities for our children?

The ongoing battle to close smaller schools is unnecessary and irrational. Small schools are intrinsically disposed to offer educational and social advantages for children. To expend energy on closing these schools diverts energy and focus from strengthening them...and worse, wrenches community centered schools from their communities and children from the schools that will have the most likelihood of meeting their needs (Jimerson, 2006, p. 17).

In the case of Janeville Elementary School, money, time, and resources that could be spent strengthening the heart of this coastal community are being spent on sustainability reviews that are arguably unsustainable. We should be looking at the ways in which we can build this community, and mobilize its people, not focusing on the ways in which we can extract from it. If we, as a province, are truly invested in the "best interests of each child", then we shouldn't be looking at student enrollment and finances, we should be looking at the very students that stand before us, and finding ways to cultivate learning experiences that are relevant to their home and heritage.

I cannot imagine putting my son on a school bus to drive all the way to Bathurst and back twice a day it just doesn't make sense, how could anyone expect these children that are raised outdoors to run and play and explore, to sit still on a bus 2 hours of their day?? At Janeville School we are a team! I wish you could witness our events, our talent shows, Christmas shows, family barbeques and suppers; do

they do that in town?? No they don't. I have friends that have children going to Terry Fox and I am not a fan. They can't have events because they can't accommodate all the parents, we accommodate the parents the sisters and brothers and the grandparents, those things are important to our children. Brody and his classmates did a dance in the talent show and he was so happy that his whole family attended, his aunty and cousins and his grandparents. Please and honestly, is it always about the money?? What about our children's futures? Isn't that more important? Our children are too young to travel to town. To be very honest we would rather home school my son then send him to Bathurst because quite simply he would be lost and forgotten in all that crowd. Whatever it takes, you need to reconsider for our children's sakes! We are so blessed that our children are attending Janeville School, the education they are receiving is phenomenal but it's more than just a school, it's a family. I have attached a few mementos for you to view, and they are just a few, I have a file box filled of them, and I cherish them all.

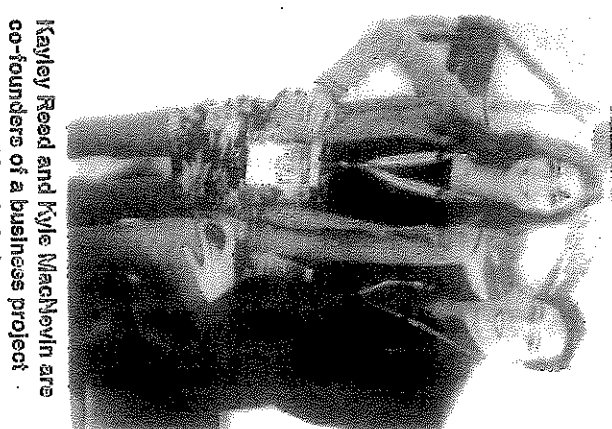

"(Wear Your Label) is a socially conscious clothing line designed to help individuals reclaim the mental health labels that people give them," said MacNevin. "The idea is to combine fashion and mental health, two fields that normally clash. So we're designing chic, current, trendy clothing but with a social and self-conscious perspective, and we're donating portion of our sales back to mental health research," added Reed.

MacNevin and Reed were vying for their category's top prize, a mentorship with the Canadian Youth Business Foundation, a Planet Hatch Jumpstart package and tickets to WhyConf 2014, a Dieppe marketing and communications conference on June 5.

Yesterday's pitches ran from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., followed immediately by the judges' deliberation and reception. But whatever the turnout, competitors like Daley weren't too concerned.

"I never did anything like this before, and it's a great experience," said the Grade 5 student, adding that the experience has provided her with a "boost of confidence."

"I'm hoping we do well, but it doesn't matter if we get a prize."

Greetings District Education Council:

I am writing this letter in support of the tireless work being done by so many dedicated and community minded individuals that are working tirelessly to save the Janeville Elementary School from closure. There are three reasons why I have chosen to send this letter to your office.

The first and most important reason is based on the safety issues of transporting young children even further then presently being done from their home to school, given the geography of the area outside of the city of Bathurst. While as a child and teen, I did not attend Janeville Elementary School, I lived in what is known locally as the "downshore" area and received public education at schools that were the forerunner to Janeville Elementary. I later worked in Bathurst traveling that part of the Acadian Peninsula for some 28 years before moving away from that area. I know very well the hazardous conditions that are created when late fall, winter and early spring temperatures create everything from freezing rain to snow; coupled with melting and refreezing conditions causing black ice resulting in treacherous road conditions. What is more, because of coastal winds sweeping across the Bay of Chaleur, causing drifts and road blockages along Highway 11 in many areas between Bathurst and Grande-Anse, what may seem like a very pleasant sunny day in the City of Bathurst changes were quickly from Salmon Beach east. There is no question in my mind that any attempt to transport children as young as kinder garden age the distance being considered from Bathurst to Paquetville and from Bathurst to Grande-Anse is multiplying many times over a heightened risk for accidents. I do not believe it is an exaggeration to compare such risks to the terrible tragedy in January of 2008 when High School Students



from Bathurst High were killed because of road conditions being what they were that time of the year.

My second reason has to do with the important place Janeville School holds within the larger community between Salmon Beach and Pokeshaw. Given the gymnasium in that school offering the wider community the opportunity to host events; often raising money for the local churches and service organizations because of its size, warrants its place to remain open in that community. It holds the distinction of being the largest venue in the area. As a result it provides a location that offers the largest seating capacity, in the area, to host events that unite the community and increase revenues that benefit the entire region spanning a 25 km radius east, west and south, from the location of the Janeville Elementary School. Quoting one resident it is without a doubt the "heart of the community."

My third reason that I name in this letter has to do with simple good fiscal management of tax payer dollars in terms of the condition of this school and the credit to those who care for it and have maintained it since it first opened. There is no question that it is structurally sound and has proven its use over the years to the point that it has not yet reached a stage of being in any way substandard for the many-many uses it has offered and will continue to offer in the future. It simply does not make good business sense to me to close a building so well constructed and maintained at the expense of tax payers and build by a government whose vision and goal was to provide what has become now only one of two Anglophone elementary schools servicing the huge geographical region of the Acadian Peninsula.

I trust that you will give this letter your attention and consideration. Along with the many other letters and correspondence your office is receiving I pray that reason will prevail and as part of your sustainable review exercise your

decision will be to honor the request for many reasons being named from those who you are hearing from to keep JANEVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL opened over the next number of years.

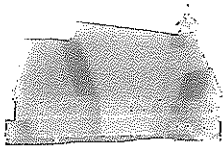

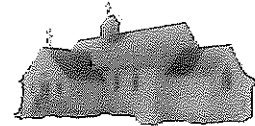

With the recent announcement, that our Janeville Elementary School is under review for possible closure in the near future; we ask that much consideration be made to the negative effect it will have on our students, as well as in our local community.

Safety, with the transportation of these students into Bathurst is of utmost concern. Consider a 4 ½ - 7 year old sitting on a bus for 1 – 1 ½ hours, each way, without a seatbelt, travelling on very rough and treacherous highways to attend school in Bathurst. Worse still, on snowpacked, icy roads!! Often sunshine and calm winds prevail in Bathurst; yet one may encounter drifting snow with white-out conditions along the school boundaries in the downshore area!

In addition, the length of our children's school day (if they are transported into Bathurst) will shorten student time for homework and extra-curriculars.

Since we are the only Rural English speaking school along the Acadian Peninsula, it is pertinent that Janeville Elementary be kept opened. We are a minority, but we, too, must have equal rights and be given an opportunity to maintain our culture. This building is a structure wherein our children are moulded into the rural lifestyle of our community. Removal of these students from our area will likely cause our major forms of employment such as fishing, farming and logging to become minimal. Since much of our tax revenue is paid from these natural resources – considerable revenue would be lost.

The teachers, past and present, have assisted our smaller class sizes to become high academic achievers.


The students at Janeville Elementary provide entertainment at Christmas and periodically throughout the year sharing their talents for parents, grandparents and many from the community (including the seniors from the Senior's residence next door). The participation from every student provides these children with the self-confidence and re-assurance they require to set higher goals for themselves as they further his / her education.

Janeville Elementary also serves our rural population as a community centre. We are grateful to have the use of this facility when requiring space to accommodate numbers greater than in other structures in our area. The building has provided space for fundraisers – eg. To whom it may concern;

I am writing this letter on behalf of myself, my children and our community in regards to the proposed closure of Janeville Elementary School.

I was born and raised in Canobie New Brunswick, part of a community known in this area as "downshore". This community has its own culture and way of life where open space and freedom to explore is the norm and fishing and farming are a way of life for most. My own father having supported and raised us as a fisherman.

Firstly, I would like to paint a firsthand picture of what you are proposing for our children and families by the closure of our school. As a child the age of 6, my mother decided to send me to school in the city. I believe she thought it would lead to a better education and I would learn a second language. I would get up in the morning with my older siblings around 6am and be ready to catch the bus at 7:45. We would make the long journey into town and I was the first to be dropped off. By the time I was dropped off there was no time to play with my classmates before the bell, they had all been there 30 to 40 minutes before and were able to get some morning play and exercise and make relationships with one another. For me, I had just enough time to get my jacket off and be at my desk. When the bell rang at the end of the day I watched as everyone left, either by bus or most would walk home. I however had to wait at the school until 3:30 when the bus came up for the junior high and highschool kids. I would be picked up and brought to the highschool to wait another half hour or so, not allowed off the bus until eventually it would start filling with these big kids, who to me at that age were like adults. I was already a shy child but this used to make me feel very small and intimidated as I was clearly out of place. I would sit right behind the bus driver and try to act like a "big" kid. However, as much as I tried to be big, I would fall asleep on the long ride home almost every day, only to be awakened by several people hunched over me trying to wake me. Of course then I woke confused and would realize I'm at my stop, embarrassed, I would quickly grab my things and get off.

By my fourth year the result of such a schedule had taken its toll. I still could not make real friendships as I could not find anything in common with the way I grew up (country) and the way they had (city). I was often ostracized for being different. My grades fell and my mother was at a loss. That's when I begged her to move me to Janeville School. I was tired of being different, of the long days, and I was afraid I was going to fail because of my grades. This is when everything changed.

Mid year of my fourth grade I started at my new school, Janeville Elementary. Within that half year my grades improved and I made friendships that continue to this day. My life turned around, I was accepted, I felt smart and encouraged because of my teachers, I found I had something to offer. I was not just the shy child in the back of the room, with smaller classes and teachers from the same community who knew me and my family, I was a person and not a number or a ghost.

I went on to flourish through school. Graduating from Bathurst High in the french immersion program that started in junior high. At the age of 18 I moved away, attended both collage and university and have spent many years working with various prominent companies in major metropolitan cities with a resume I can be proud of. I ask you to decide where the shift came from. For me, I think it is obvious that moving to Janeville Elementary was a life changer.

Second, I would like to tell you how we came to be back in this community. My husband and I met in Halifax, we had two children while living there. Life was good, work was good, daycare was good... until my son was old enough to soon start school. Wow. The schools were over populated, 4 to 5 hundred students. You could not choose which school your child would attend, it depended on your address, so the best maintained schools and programs were not for people living on the outskirts, and no french programs unless you sent them to an all french school.

So, for many reasons, this being a big one, we decided to change our lives completely and make the move back to my roots. We felt it was in the best interest of our children to live in a supportive community in a small school setting where they could find their voice, as I did. Now, we have two children attending Janeville. It would sadden my heart tremendously to know we did this only to find out our children may not have the security and education they deserve, only to find long bus rides, overpopulation in the classrooms and overstretched teachers. This is clearly NOT in their best interest.

Thirdly, I would like to address my concerns of the school closure as a parent and community member.

- Would there be another bus run put into place for our elementary student to come home when their classes are over? Or would they have to wait until the older students are also out? Has the province thought about this additional cost? Would you think it appropriate to put elementary students who start at the age of 5 on the bus with high school students?
- These children, who now start at the age of 5, would have an extra hour to an hour and a half to their day, is this in the best interest of these kids? And then expect them to be attentive with their homework?
- We have terrible road conditions in this area during winter. As a parent how will I feel secure that my young child is safe travelling so far in these conditions?
- There is only one school in the district to "place" these students (our children) that is already overpopulated with not enough educators. What "tactics" does the province have in mind to handle this?

Our community supports the children with afterschool activities, concerts, science fairs and many other gatherings. Everything is personal for the children and the community as a whole. They are one and the same. The school is a central focus that brings everyone together.

Lastly, I understand that in this day and age most things come down to the almighty dollar. Balancing a budget, taking from here to spend more there. We must trust that our government is making decisions based on what is good for our province as a whole. We must TRUST that the RIGHT people are making the RIGHT decisions based on what is RIGHT. Therefore, is it RIGHT to keep squeezing down on our Communities/Cities/Provinces most precious resource, the future of everything to come, our children and the quality of their education?

Central United Church wishes to state its unequivocal support of keeping Janeville Elementary School open and operating. Janeville Elementary not only allows our community to support our youth, be engaged with our youth, but also to add a sense of pride and being a part of community to our youth.

Our small rural area, affectionately known as "downshore", is comprised of a handful of small communities with limited available infrastructure. Downshore is known for its unique rural life style where children have historically been collectively identified as being hard workers and high achievers. A large part of this is due to the sentiment that it does in fact take a village to raise a child. Downshore is that village and our children go to Janeville School.

Janeville School also offers the largest facility available in our rural community for public gatherings, concerts, meetings, and other social events. Central United Church has in fact used the gym facility to put on community concerts which draw too large a crowd to be accommodated at our existing hall. This has allowed us to bring in popular musical groups we would have not been able to host without the school. Church youth groups, such as Beavers, have also used the gym for activities and many of our congregation have interacted via community programs and activities held at the school. It is local, easily accessible for seniors and people with disabilities and can accommodate large groups. It is a wonderful gathering place for many community events.

Central United has in fact an inter-generational outreach project under development with the aim of increasing the interaction of our youth with seniors. The main objective of this program is to have weekly activities with our youth of Janeville School interacting with seniors and other interested community members on Wednesday afternoons (this is possible as the students are free of classes each Wednesday afternoon due to early morning start times each day as per busing schedules). We strongly feel that a program of this type will act inclusively to enrich both the lives of our seniors and our youth. This is essential to the sustainability of our downshore community.

Having Janeville Elementary active in our community embodies the spirit of an inclusive community. The school throughout its history has been open and involved with bringing seniors, parents and the community at large into the school environment and offers the chance for all to interact with our youth. This environment allows all of the community to show pride and support to these children and makes youth in turn feel valued and important as part of the downshore community. This is so essential in the development of positive, self-confident youths with a sense of community involvement that is so often lacking today.

We strongly feel that Janeville School is the heart of "downshore". We stand with pride with all concerned parties in support of keeping Janeville Elementary as part of our collective community.

There is not much in the way of existing infrastructure for our community; we have two larger church denominations and one small one, a volunteer fire station, and our school. Each of these play an integral part in keeping our community vibrant and cohesive. Each group depends in some way on another, and as is the local tradition, each group helps each other out when needed. This is just our downshore way.

Our congregation is comprised of members from the same rural communities as Janeville School, Salmon Beach, Janeville, Canobie, Clifton, Stonehaven, New Bandon and Pokeshaw. These small rural communities are known collectively, and affectionately as "downshore". Our downshore is a tight knit community with a rural sense of community that is disappearing quickly .

Our "downshore" way of life is becoming unique -- small rural communities where our children, seniors, and all in between ages are treated inclusively, and interact at all social functions.

To Whom It May Concern:

We are writing this letter to you, not only as very concerned parents, but also as former students of Janeville Elementary School. Both my husband and I had the privilege of attending of this wonderful modern school when it first opened its doors in 1981. At that time, I was a grade two student, and my husband, a grade six student. Some of the best friendships we ever formed were when we attended Janeville School and are carried through still today. Both my husband and I were students at Janeville Elementary until we completed grade six.

Although we both moved away to further our education, we returned to the downshore area, the place we call home. It was vital for us to raise our family with the same values, morals and principles that were embedded upon us by our families at an early age.

Now, as parents of a child who attends this school, we still feel that same pride today as we did so many years ago, but for many different reasons. First of all, quality of education: Given the reality that there are so few students per teacher ratio, more one on one support time with the teacher can be granted to the students, if necessary. Teachers can focus their efforts individually and specifically to each child in any challenges they may struggle with....no one gets overlooked.

Second of all, these children are not only students. They too, are teachers. After school hours and week-ends are spent, for the most part, hunting, fishing, dancing, baking, singing, etc. Some are athletes, others entrepreneurs. The list goes on and on. All of the knowledge that they achieve from their other activities is shared in the classroom and in their stories. These are what fashion the students and make them who they are.

It takes a community to raise a child, but, it also takes a child to raise a community. The students at Janeville Elementary School keep the community united; whether it's Christmas concerts, Talent Shows, turkey suppers, Christmas Bizarre's, year-end BBQ's, etc., if functions are held at the school, everyone is there to support them. The students are the common thread which ties this downshore community together as one. I do not feel that this would be found in a large urban school.

In addition, the New Bandon – Salmon Beach Volunteer Fire Department is located within a short walking distance of the school. Furthermore, the students know the firefighters as they, too, are members of the community, family, friends and some, even fathers of students.

Closing the school would greatly impact students in a negative manner. They would be confined to long bus rides, which could, and have proven to be, very hazardous during winter months. Not so many years ago, the city of Bathurst, and this School District, faced a terrible tragedy because of winter road conditions. This is certainly not something our community, or city, would want to face again.

Janeville Elementary School is the core of our community. Not only is it the foundation of education for our children, it is also the foundation of many families and friends. It represents who we are as individuals, and, most importantly, a community.

Janeville Elementary School is not only a school for our children.....it is their family, friends, neighbors and community.....Janeville Elementary School is their home.

Dear Sir/Madame;

The introduction of Policy 409, by our present government, in March of this year, is forcing many communities to take a good look at the circumstances surrounding our local schools. The policy contains a Student Enrolment Trigger which when a school meets or surpasses the established thresholds, a sustainability study of that school must follow unless there is an exemption to this process.

We, the Parent School Support Committee, for Janeville Elementary School intend to provide you with the following compelling reasons as to why we feel we should be exempt from this review;

- Our school was built in 1982 - the building is a one level structure, in excellent condition, located across the street from our local fire department.
- Enrolment over the last ten years has remained relatively constant and will actually increase in the coming year.
- 100% of our children are bussed to Janeville Elementary. Currently busses begin picking up students at 7:05am for an 8:05am start to the day. Having the students moved to the nearest school would involve an increase of about 20 minutes to this bus ride every morning and afternoon.
- We will incur added costs to bussing if we were to move the students from rural areas to the city of Bathurst.
- Winter travelling conditions for Routes 11 and 340 deteriorate quickly and dramatically with white out conditions and roads becoming impassable due to drifting and snowbanks - (with cutbacks to plowing this has become even more drastic in the last year). The Chaleur Bay is beautiful, but ensuring students' safety of travel would be a daunting task during the November to April winter season.

- Janeville Elementary School provides education for all Anglophone students from Bathurst to the furthest reaches of the Acadian Peninsula. We are the closest and only Anglophone school in a primarily Francophone area.
- Local Community involvement - Our school provides this community with Christmas concerts/plays, craft fairs, weekly sports nights, children's soccer, walking club, concerts- Fiddling shows, talent shows, Remembrance Day events, science fairs, and winter carnival events, Parents, grandparents, and extended families fill the gymnasium for events put forth by our young students.
- We feel parental involvement would be significantly hampered by moving our students into the city. After school participation in sports or activities would be significantly decreased due to timing and the distance needing to be travelled.

In closing, we feel that the present level of education provided to our young students would be jeopardized, most forms of after school activities would be all but eliminated, and parental involvement would be seriously challenged.
